

When you peruse the new car inventory at a Hoffman Auto Group dealership, you don't have to compromise on getting the exact vehicle features you want. For example, you may be eyeing a new 2017 Ruby Red Metallic Ford Mustang convertible, but find you are not thrilled with its standard black interior. Well, you can have your cake and eat it too. Check out these ideas for vehicle personalization that won't break the bank and will ultimately deliver the biggest smile to your face when you pick up your new ride...

Heated Seats

When the weather gets cold, especially in the northernmost parts of Connecticut, nothing feels as welcome and luxurious as heated seats. Although heated seats are becoming standard equipment on most well-optioned vehicles, some vehicles leave the factory without them. Hoffman can upgrade regular seats with the same technology the vehicle manufacturer uses. This especially makes sense for customers who prefer a cloth interior but also crave a warm backside. Hoffman can have the work completed before you pick up the vehicle, and the switches will mimic the controls on fully-loaded models with OFF/HIGH/LOW settings.



Rear Parking Sensors

Some sage driver's ed advice is never back up farther than you need to. But even backing up just a necessary amount can risk unwanted property damage—or worse. In 2018, it will be mandatory for all vehicle manufacturers to have a back-up camera installed on all vehicles leaving the factory.



Even better equipped vehicles will add a warning chime to the back-up camera camera to signal if danger is detected. Hoffinan Auto can add reverse parking sensors to all vehicles, even if they didn't come that way from the factory. Parking sensor systems use ultrasonic proximity detectors embedded in rear bumpers that measure the distance to nearby objects. The system then warns the driver by audible means of the risk of collision. The audible feedback to the driver indicates the distance to the obstacle—it will beep faster as you get closer to the obstacle. Whether it be an out-of-sightline fire hydrant or a small child, gratitude is what you'll feel if the technology is ever needed.

The Connected Car via DroneMobile

The ability to communicate with your vehicle via your smartphone makes a lot of sense. Your vehicle can alert you when it's time to be serviced. The DroneMobile (www.dronemobile.com) can be integrated into any vehicle. And in certain models you can even 'push' directions from your smartphone right to the vehicle's infotainment screen. That way, when you get to your car, you can pull out without first having to program the navigation system. DroneMobile takes this concept from the car manufacturers a step further. When installed, the unit gives you the ability to lock or unlock the car, remote start the engine, and receive GPS tracking updates right on your phone. Lock your keys in the car? No worries: a few keystrokes on the DroneMobile app, a signal is sent, and the car is magically opened. When the Hartford Line commuter rail is ready for passengers in January 2018, you can be on the train in Windsor Locks, send a command from your phone and have a warm vehicle waiting for you when you pull into Hartford. Teenage drivers have you worried? The DroneMobile app can alert you to violations of speeds you can predetermine, and will alert you with a text message if your kid crosses a boundary you have established through technology known as geofencing. DroneMobile allows you to have connectivity and convenience integrated with your new vehicle and controlled from your smartphone.

Reading to school kids, 5K walks and keeping score at Special Olympics events may not be the first images that come to mind when you think of an auto dealership, but at Hoffman Auto Group the connection between cars and caring is clear.

Of course, at the heart of the Hoff-

Hoffman stated, "It is

one of the many reasons I have been personally involved in the Boys & Girls Club for many years. The impact it makes on the lives of kids in Hartford and beyond is truly amazing." Bradley Hoffman is the incoming Board Chair for the Hartford County branch this year.

The community partnership from Hoffman Auto Group that especially resonates with Lane is its support of Susan G. Komen Southern New England. "I'm a breast cancer survivor," says Lane. "It means a lot to have the company I work for not only stand by me, but invest in the lives of other survivors. These women are our mothers, sisters, daughters and friends." Though Hoffman had previously given financial support to Komen Connecticut's (now known as Komen of Southern New England) annual Bushnell Park Race for the Cure, October 2015 presented a unique sponsorship opportunity: Rappel for the Cure.

"When Komen created an event to raise funds and awareness with a thrilling rappel over State House Square, there was a big tie-in for me," explains Lane. When she was first diag-



nosed, she visited a climbing guide friend in Maine and did something she had never done before. "I actually climbed over 300 feet up the side of a mountain with views of the ocean far below, and rappelled back down. I just didn't want to think about cancer. And I'll tell you what," she laughs, "when you're on the side of a cliff, standing on the little rock ledge and looking out over the ocean—you don't think about cancer! You think about just getting back down safely. This experience made me realize I was stronger than I gave myself credit."

So Lane jumped at the chance to go over the edge again. This time, in State House Square, as she rappelled 14 stories, not only did she have the full support of Hoffman Auto Group (serving as the event's main Landing Zone sponsor) but she also had the personal

The event had great meaning to me, and has a ripple effect in the community, to show our support in such a powerful way."

BOXING:

■ In 1999, Hartford's Willie Pep was anointed the "#1 Featherweight Boxer of the 20th Century" by the Associated Press and the "#1 Featherweight of All Time" by the International Boxing Research Organization in 2005. Pep was World Featherweight Champion twice between 1947 and 1950.

On September 15, 1989, Hartford's Marlon Starling won the WBC World Welterweight Title at the Civic Center for the second time. Starling had a great career and fought many of his most important bouts at the Civic Center, compiling a 45–6–1 record. He was victorious in 10 championship bouts, winning or defending his Welterweight Championship.

COLLEGE BASEBALL:

On May 21, 1981, Yale Field was the site of what's considered by many to be the greatest college baseball game ever played, an NCAA Northeast Regional tilt between Yale University and St. John's University. Attendance was estimated at 2,500–3,000 fans. Yale's Ron Darling pitched a no-hitter through II innings but lost the game I–0 on a

double steal in the 12th

inning. St. John's Frank Viola was the opposing pitcher. Ironically, they would later become teammates when they both played for the NY Mets.

On May 20, 2001, Frank "Porky" Vieira, baseball coach at University of New Haven since the program's inception in 1962, won his 1,000th game. Vieira finished his career with an outstanding 1,127–324–6 record. Along the way, he coached many tremendous

players at UNH, including NL Cy Young Award winner Steve Bedrosian of the Philadelphia Phillies, first-round draft pick Cameron Drew of the Houston Astros, and Dave Wallace, a pitcher who became a World Series champion as a professional pitching coach with the Boston Red Sox.

COLLEGE BASKETBALL:

UConn hired Geno Auriemma in August, 1985 and a dynasty was born. Since then, the UConn Women's Basketball Team has won II NCAA National Championships. Auriemma has won 7 Naismith Awards for National Coach of the Year. He has won at UConn at an 87.7% clip. Auriemma has also won two Olympic gold medals as coach of USA Women's Basketball. All of these statistical accomplishments are "so far"...

■ In 1986, UConn hired Jim Calhoun as head coach of the Men's Basketball

Team. Calhoun led the Huskies to three NCAA titles. The retired Calhoun is widely regarded as one of the greatest college basketball coaches of all time.

On March 22, 1990, UConn's Tate George caught a 92-foot pass from teammate Scott Burrell, turned and shot the winning basket in the final second to defeat Clemson 71-70 and propel the Huskies to the Elite Eight of the NCAA tournament for the first time in school history.

In 2004 and 2014, both the UConn Men's and Women's Basketball Teams won NCAA National Championships during the same season.

The 2016 UConn Women's Basketball Team won an unprecedented fourth consecutive NCAA National Championship under Auriemma.

COLLEGE FOOTBALL:

The Yale Bowl opened on November 21, 1914 with a capacity of 70,896. The first bowl-shaped stadium in the U.S. became an official National Historic Landmark in 1987. It not only hosted Yale athletic events but outdoor concerts until local residents squashed the concert series a couple of decades ago. The New York Giants were temporary tenants for two seasons in the mid-1970s while Giants Stadium was being built. Giants Stadium has since been replaced, but the Yale Bowl rolls on, impressive and inspiring. The edifice was the inspiration for its younger West Coast cousin, the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif. The Yale Bowl hosts fewer people these days for most Yale Football games, but every other November it takes on special life as people pour in for "The Game," Yale versus Harvard, one of the oldest and greatest rivalries in college sports. In 2014, Yale welcomed back many of the great athletes who competed on its hallowed grounds to celebrate the Yale Bowl's 100th anniversary.

On November 5, 1955, after a pointed motivational talk from Yale Coach Jordan Oliver, the 19-point underdog Bulldogs, who the previous year were undefeated before being crushed by Army 48-7, upset their nationally-ranked opponent Army, who had habitually made

mincemeat of Ivy League competition, in front of a crowd of 61,000 by a score of 14–12. It was the 40th meeting between the schools, but the next meeting would not occur for another 30 years as the Ivy League began full competition in 1956 and Penn replaced Army on Yale's schedule.

In 1965, Yale hired legendary coach Carmen Cozza to take over the Yale football program. Cozza stayed for 32 glorious seasons, compiling an overall 179–119–5 record. In the Ivy League, Cozza's squads registered a 135-85-5 record, with 10 conference championships. Inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2002, Cozza finished his career with a 16-15-1 record against archrival Harvard. While at Yale, over 99% of Cozza's players received degrees. He coached five Rhodes Scholars and 96 All-Ivy players.

In 1999, UConn hired Randy Edsall to lift its fledging football program from NCAA division I-AA to I-A. Edsall did a marvelous job building the program, taking the Huskies to Arizona in 2011 to play in the Fiesta Bowl.

With Larry Kelly (end) in 1936 and Clint Frank (halfback) in 1937, Yale University had college football's first back-to-back Heisman Trophy winners, a feat repeated by only two other schools (Army's Doc Blanchard in 1945 and Insurance City Open Glenn Davis in 1946, and Ohio State's Archie Griffin in 1974 and 1975).

COLLEGE SQUASH:

On January 18, 2012, Yale ended Trinity College's squash program's 252-game winning streak in a match at Yale in New Haven. The Bantams had won 13 consecutive National Championships, the loss to Yale ending the longest intercollegiate sports winning streak in U.S. history.

GOLF:

In July 1956, the soon-to-be-legendary Arnold Palmer won his first-ever U.S. tournament, the Insurance City Open at Wethersfield Country Club, in exciting fashion. Palmer, who passed away September 25, defeated Ted Kroll on the second playoff hole.


48-year-old Waterbury native Julius Boros won the 1968 PGA Championship at The Pecan Valley Club in San Antonio, TX, becoming the oldest Major Championship winner in golf history. It was Boros' third major win.

In 2007, the white knight of Connecticut major pro sports, the Travelers Companies, rode to the rescue under its red umbrella as it became the new title sponsor of the PGA Tour stop in Cromwell. The Travelers' commitment, and a fortuitous PGA schedule opening, allowed the tournament to live on. The PGA has had a tour stop in the Greater Hartford area since 1952.

\$20,000

In 1967, Charlie Sifford rose to the top of an illustrious field to become the first African-American champion of a PGA tour event. This momentous victory took place at Wethersfield Country Club, site of the Greater Hartford Open.

• On August 8, 2016, Jim Furyk set the PGA single-round scoring record at the Travelers Championship at TPC River Highlands in Cromwell as he authored a 58!



HOCKEY:

The Hartford Whalers became an NHL Franchise in 1979, giving Connecticut its first true top-level professional team.

Bob McVey, of Hamden and Harvard, won the gold medal as a member of the 1960 Olympic team that gave us "The Forgotten Miracle" at Squaw Valley, Calif.

■ On November 9, 2009, Brian Leetch of Cheshire was inducted into the Hockey Hall of Fame in Toronto, Ont., a watershed moment for Connecticut hockey programs from mites to high school. Leetch spent 18 seasons in the NHL. In 1989, he was awarded the Calder Trophy as the league's top rookie. Recognized as one the best defensemen of all time, he won the Norris Trophy twice for being the top defense player of the year. He was also the first American to win the Conn Smythe Trophy, emblematic of the MVP of the Stanley Cup playoffs, arguably the most difficult tournament in sports. The culmination of his storied career, Leetch was an NHL Stanley Cup Champion in 1994.

Jonathan Quick, who played high school hockey in Hamden and at Avon Old Farms School, won the Stanley Cup twice as goaltender for the Los Angeles Kings (2012 and 2014). In 2012, Quick won the Conn Smythe

> Trophy as MVP of the NHL Stanley Cup Playoffs as he led the Left Coasters to the crown. He had three shutouts and a 16–4 record during the playoff tournament. Quick also won a silver medal as a member of the 2010 U.S. Olympic team in Vancouver, B.C.

In April of 2013, the Yale Hockey Team won the NCAA National Championship in Pittsburgh, Pa. The team they defeated in the title game was Quinnipiac University. The Yale and QU campuses are a mere 8 miles apart along Whitney Avenue in New Haven and Hamden. Yale and QU regularly play before sold-out arenas. When the two ECAC rivals square off twice a year, tickets are almost impossible to obtain. Quinnipiac returned to the title game again last spring in Tampa,

Fla., losing to the University of North Dakota. The epicenter of college hockey may very well be here in Connecticut.

LITTLE LEAGUE WORLD SERIES:

On August 26, 1989, 13-yearold Chris Drury pitched Trumbull, Conn. to a Little League World Series Championship over Kaohsiung City, Taiwan in Williamsport, Pa. Drury went on to play hockey at Boston University, where he won the hockey "Heisman," the Hobey Baker Award. In his rookie season for the Colorado Avalanche, he recorded 44 points and won the Calder Trophy as the league's top rookie, becoming the first player to win the Hobey Baker Memorial Award and the Calder Memorial Trophy. Following a career in which he became known for clutch playoff play and was a Stanley Cup Champion (for the Avalanche in 2000–2001) and two-time Olympic silver medalist, Drury was inducted into the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame in 2015.

SKATING:

In 1976, Greenwich native Dorothy Hamill, christened "America's Sweetheart," won the gold medal at the Innsbruck, Austria Olympiad for her figure skating prowess.

SKELETON:

In 2002, West Hartford native Jimmy Shea, Jr., a third-generation Winter Olympics competitor, won the gold medal for skeleton racing in Salt Lake City. He was also the first American to win a World Cup race and a World Championship in the sport, retiring in 2005 with more World Cup victories than any other American.



TENNIS:

• On July 25, 1987, John McEnroe and Boris Becker participated in what's believed to be the longest match in Davis Cup history involving an American team. Played at the Hartford Civic Center, the marathon match started at 4:37 pm and finished at 11:17 pm, the 19-year-old Becker finally prevailing over 28-year-old McEnroe.

■ In 1991, the Connecticut Tennis Center opened in New Haven on the Yale campus. Eventually expanding into a 15,000-seat venue, the stadium has provided key support of professional tennis in Connecticut and hosted many of the world's top players, especially in professional women's tennis.


■ In 1973 and 1974, the New York Football Giants, finding themselves without a home while Giants Stadium was



being built and Yankee Stadium was under renovation, used Yale Bowl as their home field for two seasons. The Giants left Yale a year ahead of their expected departure, having earned a dismal combined home record of I-II at the Yale Bowl.










■ On January 18, 1978, the Hartford Civic Center arena roof collapsed just hours after a UConn basketball game was held there. Fortunately, no one was injured.

■ On April 9, 1986, the Hartford Whalers lost a heartbreaking Game Seven of the Adams Division finals in overtime to the Montreal Canadiens at the Forum in Montreal. The Canadiens went on to capture the Stanley Cup. The Whalers were the only team during the tournament to extend Montreal to seven games.

■ On March 24, 1992, the Whalers lost another heartbreaking Game Seven to the Canadiens at the Forum, this time in double overtime in the Adams Division semifinals.

■ On April 13, 1997, the Hartford Whalers played their last game in Hartford. The City and State lost its only major league sports franchise when the State and Whalers' ownership could not reach agreement upon a modern new facility. (There was speculation

that our Governor was preoccupied courting the New England Patriots.) In 2006, the reinvented team won the Stanley Cup as the Carolina Hurricanes, a bitter pill to swallow for Whalers' fans.

■ In November 1998, Connecticut tried to lure the New England Patriots to a newly proposed riverfront stadium that would be built entirely with public funds. Patriots' owner Robert Kraft pulled out of the plan just two days before there would have been financial penalties for the Patriots, who eventually got a new stadium built in Foxboro, Mass., leaving Connecticut sports fans feeling used as a bargaining chip.

■ In 2007, Buick pulled its sponsorship of the Hartford PGA Tour stop, leaving the tournament in a precarious position and nearly losing a major professional sporting event that had run continuously in Connecticut since 1952. ■ On January 8, 2011, Randy Edsall, the UConn football coach who engineered the upgrade of the UConn program to NCAA Division I-A status, left the team in the middle of the night to sign a contract with the University of Maryland. Just moments following the Huskies' 48–20 loss to Oklahoma at the Fiesta Bowl, the first BCS Bowl game in UConn history, Edsall flew to Maryland for his interview and did not return to Connecticut with his players. The coach who had led the program to promising new heights was gone.

■ On December 13, 2012, the basketballonly schools of the Big East dissolved the conference, leaving UConn looking for a new home. The Big East Conference was established in 1979, and for many years was arguably the preeminent league in college basketball.

This autumn, we decided to honor a male and a female returning high school senior as our student-athletes of the year. An honoree would have to be at the pinnacle of his or her sport and certified by his or her coach as an upstanding student and citizen. It was quite a coincidence that the number two athletes in both sports by the measures we were using were attending the same schools! But we realized it wasn't entirely a coincidence, because these athletes have been pushing each other to greater heights for years. So we decided to take the unusual step of recognizing these worthy athletes with runner-up honors.

Postscript: In the Fall 2016 State Open, the friendly competition between the runners remained close, with Collins finishing second and DeLoreto third. Runner-up Male Athlete C.J. Holmes Cheshire Academy

It's impossible to meet Black and not immediately be impressed with his charm and easy, graceful athleticism. A six-foot-three wide receiver with 4.4 40 speed, Black is a four-star athlete who has been courted by many of the top football powers and has narrowed his choices to Michigan, Stanford and Alabama. His coach, David Dykeman, testifies, "Tarik is a phenomenal student. He's a great person in our community. He's the complete package, the true student-athlete."

Black says he and Holmes, both team captains, have been "friends from a young age." He prefers leading by example to being overly vocal. He will out-speed you on the field, and there's plenty of tape to prove it. He is most grateful to his mom, he's a big LeBron James fan and he sees himself as a business major in college.

Female Athlete of the Year Katherine DeLoreto, Tolland High School

Standing in front of DeLoreto, you might not realize what an accomplished cross-county runner you have encountered. Her coach, Judi Lafontaine, who has enjoyed unparalleled success at Tolland High School, acknowledges that DeLoreto has more the powerful build of an 800-meter runner than the wispy build of a long-distance specialist. And indeed, DeLoreto excels in the middle distances in track. Lafontaine describes DeLoreto as her "most competitive athlete" and Collins her "most dedicated." DeLoreto says she and Collins are "really good friends and training partners" since seventh grade. DeLoreto is both a vocal leader and a leader by example, "and," chimes in Collins, "a great motivational speaker in front of our whole team." DeLoreto would rather out-speed than outlast. She's grateful to her dad, admires U.S. Olympic runner Brenda Martinez and intends to study education and psychology in college.





Runner-Up Male Athlete C.J. Holmes, Cheshire Academy

Holmes is a three-star athlete who has already committed to Notre Dame. Although he modestly says "I'm just a kid from a small town with a great support system," in actuality he's a Swiss Army knife of a player, capable of playing running back, receiver, defensive back

and a number of other positions. Asked whether he prefers to out-speed or outlast, he exclaims, "Both!" He's most grateful to his grandfather, he is a big fan of safety Tyrann Mathieu of the Arizona Cardinals and he intends to major in business and marketing in college.

Runner-Up Female Athlete Hayley Collins, Tolland High School

Collins sees herself as more a leader by example than a vocal leader. Her philosophy is outlast, rather than out-speed. In track, she runs the 3200 and she's interested in the steeplechase as well. She's grateful to her dad, she's a big fan of Deena Kastor, who holds the American marathon record, and she hasn't decided what to study, but leans toward attending the University of New Hampshire. Says Lafontaine, "Hayley is the most dedicated runner Tolland has ever seen."







The top-tier 1.5liter turbo powerplant is a gem, offering more torque and horsepower than the 2.4-liter base model with a bonus of better fuel economy, too. (A similar gas-sipping version is found in the Civic.) Honda has thoughtfully redone the interior for more room and cargo space. Because the CR-V usually winds up in the hands of a more mature demographic than the Civic, the infotainment system has a dedicated volume knob instead of buttons. Expect wonderful EPA mileage (Honda is predicting best in class) and NCAP 5-star crash worthiness.

The latest generation of the turbocharged B48 500cc per cylinder modular engine provides the perfect balance between economy and sportiness. To offer even more choice of body style, the new 5-series will also be available as a Gran Turismo hatchback. This could be the perfect vehicle for those who regularly carry long items, such as snow skis to hit the Mohawk Mountain slopes.

2017 BMW 540xi, price TBA

As of this writing, BMW has not let the cat out of the bag regarding the specific engine slated for the 540, but the rumor mill suggests a new 4.0-liter V8 that debuted at the Paris Auto Show in early October. 2017 Ford Super Duty Truck, starting at \$33,730

Whether you want to pull a boat, camper or horse trailer, Ford has your back with the Super Duty. You can carry 7,630 pounds in its bed. Wait, you say, that's not earth shattering. If you read that carefully, that's the bed. Behind the truck, you can pull 32,500 pounds on a trailer. The 6.7-liter Power Stroke



features 925 lb-ft of torque, so you'll be able to pull the neighbor's house should you need to. But the genius is in the implementation of technology that makes the rig easy to drive. The Blind Spot Information System, suite of onboard cameras and Ford Trailer Backup Assist make pulling big things behind the truck easy as pie.

2017 Nissan Armada,

starting at \$44,400

When the weather turns rough, the all-new Nissan Armada is a vehicle you can count on to get your kids to all their after-school activities. Most consumers may not realize it, but when the U.N. needs a vehicle to get around sub-Saharan Africa, they turn to an international version of the Armada known as the Patrol. The Armada comes with 9 inches of ground clearance to smash through any snowstorm. 


